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Nursing Study Tour in Belize: Vital Care and Cultural Immersion

Launching on an extraordinary

journey in January 2023, a group of 12 students, alumni, faculty, and staff set out on a nine-day trip to Belize. As part of Cedar Crest Nursing's Global Community Study Tours, the experience aimed to provide essential healthcare to vulnerable populations while offering participants a profound insight into the socio-cultural and economic dimensions of healthcare in Belize.

Asher Atwood '21, an alumna who previously participated in nursing trips to Panama and Tanzania, found her experiences working in developing countries to be transformative. "By traveling to other countries, especially developing ones, I can appreciate the technology we have here in the U.S. while also learning how to care for patients at the most basic level," says Atwood. Working with undergraduate students during the study tour allowed her to gain experience as a nurse educator.

During the trip, the participants conducted home visits, established field clinics, and provided crucial healthcare services such as assessments, exams, and checks. They treated nearly 130 patients and distributed around 500 pounds of donated supplies, making a significant impact in the community.

The group also immersed themselves in Belizean culture, where they met a nurse, a medicine man, and explored the Lamanai Mayan ruins. The journey concluded with an overnight stay on Caye Caulker, where they enjoyed snorkeling and beach activities.

This experience fostered a deeper appreciation for cultural differences, a curiosity for diverse healthcare systems, and a global perspective in their caregiving endeavors.









Buon Viaggio! Sophomore Expedition: Rome, Italy

Embarking on the remarkable sixth annual Carmen Twillie Ambar Sophomore Expedition this past March,

a group of 120 students, faculty, and staff immersed themselves into an array of service, learning, and cultural experiences in Rome, Italy.

Sierra Lockhart '22 & MA '23, trip chaperone and coordinator, celebrated the opportunity for students to exhibit leadership skills and forge connections beyond the campus. Witnessing their remarkable transformation, Lockhart remarked, "I saw a different side of them when we were in Rome...they were always speaking up and could navigate through the city that they had never been to before on their own."



The expedition featured visits to renowned Roman landmarks, including the Colosseum, Forum, Circus Maximus, Catacombs, Spanish Steps, and Pantheon. They saw an opera performance, a professional soccer match, received an ancient water treatment at a Roman spa, and explored the hauntingly preserved ancient city of Pompeii,



forever marked by the eruption of Mount Vesuvius.

Dedicated to making a positive impact, the Falcons joined forces with the nonprofit organization ReTake to clean up the picturesque Trastevere neighborhood. Their ReTake supervisor provided an impromptu history lesson, adding depth to their understanding of the area.

President Elizabeth M. Meade, Ph.D., expressed her profound admiration for the program's impact on students, deeming it the most influential experience she has witnessed in higher education. She takes pride in offering this transformative opportunity exclusively as part of a Cedar Crest College education, with no additional costs beyond the passport requirement.

Alternative Spring Break:

Giving back to our community with, "In the Valley, For the Valley."



In Spring 2023, the Lutz Center hosted seven students for an Alternative Spring Break aptly titled "In the Valley, For the Valley." Michele Moyer, Director of Career Development and Community Engagement, and Takyra Batz '20, Assistant Director for Community Engagement and Leadership Development, coordinated and led the week of service.

Alternative Spring Break offers students the opportunity to forgo a traditional spring break vacation in favor of a week of impactful service. This year's took place in the heart of our community. The inaugural, "In the Valley, For the Valley," focused on our Greater Lehigh Valley community's needs and businesses and was available to students at no additional cost of attendance.

The students' first day featured a trip to the PPL Center for an informative tour of the facility and, as a bonus, they attended a Lehigh Valley Phantoms ice hockey game-many for the first time ever! On the second day, students headed to Southside Bethlehem for a tour of the Banana Factory where they assisted with multiple art projects, mosaics and painting touch-ups. Before leaving, students were able to visit the glass studio and learn about glass art from the building's manager.

The students spent their third day at the Wildlands Conservancy in Emmaus, assisting with various projects throughout the Orchid Place Preserve to help prevent and clean up trail runoff.

On the fourth and final day, students went to Allentown and met with the Valley Against Sex Trafficking (VAST) organization, where they learned about sex trafficking and its presence in the Valley. Students then went to 7th Street in Allentown to hand out water, food, and socks, make hygiene kits, and chat with survivors. After VAST, students embarked on an excursion to Lil-Le-High Fish Nursery to feed the fish and close out their Spring Break.



Alumnae Stories of Service

Sharing the value of volunteerism, alumna Skye Mullarkey '07 revealed her story of giving back while at Cedar Crest College, and how this is a sentiment that she still carries with her today. Since day one at CCC, Skye still remembers going up to Hawk Mountain to clear trails during orientation, and her first-year seminar project tutoring students in downtown Allentown. Once joining Alpha Phi Omega, she met students who also had a passion for service and completed projects for many organizations. Other memorable projects included painting seasonal artwork on the windows of Cedarbrook Nursing Home, along

While she was a student at Cedar Crest, she spent her time volunteering to run campus elections. Now, she volunteers for environmental causes taking water readings at streams. "The real reward of volunteering is knowing that I'm doing something positive for our planet every day, in my small way I know I'm making a difference," says Debbie. "I have met so many wonderful, interesting people who share my passion for the environment and been pushed out of my comfort zone through volunteering. Who knew I would be climbing down stream banks and clearing a path on my way to take water readings at my age!"

Tennille's generosity and dedication has led her to win many awards for being a significant contributor to these worthwhile causes. 

Associate Professor of Criminal Justice, Dr. Scott Hoke, and Professor of Psychology, Dr. Kerrie Baker, volunteer at data centers and police departments in the area with their criminal justice students. Students provide a free yearly analysis of call data for the Abington Township Police Department. They

take their call volume data, analyze it for geographic trends and patterns, and then send the department a report. It entails over 100 hours of work between Hoke and his students. Some of the students working on the data are part of class Criminal Justice 310, and some are paid to do it as research assistants. This service is completed voluntarily for the police department because they allow the College to use their data in Hoke's mapping classes.
