WELCOMING THE CLASS OF 2023

Orientation is one of the most important weeks for firstyear and transfer students who are making Cedar Crest College their home for the next several years. Activities during the week are designed to help the transition go smoothly for each new student.

On Thursday, August 22, 2019, the College welcomed 207 students in the class of 2023, 28 transfer students, and nine international students. After a busy day of moving into the residence hall rooms with the help of parents, faculty, staff, athletes, and alumnae volunteers, meeting essential campus staff members, and becoming acquainted with the beautiful campus, the new students lined-up in Blaney Hall to officially introduce themselves as members of the Cedar Crest community during the Open Door ceremony.

Friday brought orientation sessions, meetings with faculty advisors, and most memorably, the annual Strawberry Festival on President Elizabeth Meade's lawn. There, new students had the opportunity to interact with each other, as well as faculty and staff members, listen to live music, and play lawn games.





On Saturday, as a way to help students connect to the city of Allentown and get to know a part of their new home, Tammy Bean, Director of Community Service Programs and Ethical Life Site Coordinator, organized a day of service that gave students the opportunity to work with Friends of Allentown Parks and Recreation Department to remove invasive plant species at Trexler Park.

The week culminated with the Convocation ceremony and all-campus picnic on Sunday, August 25, 2019. During Convocation, four returning sophomores, Hannah Stott from Tamaqua Area High School, Delaney Robbins from East Stroudsburg High School, Mackenzie Lewis from the Lehigh Valley Charter High School for the Performing Arts, and Lauren DeSanctis from Parkland High School received the 2018-2019 Valedictory Award from the Cedar Crest College Alumnae Association for having the highest GPA at the conclusion of their first year. In addition to their award, their high schools will receive new books for their libraries. Other award presentations included the Mary L. Romig Prize presented to Rebecca Dolan, the Haff Award presented to Erin Rooney, The Gloria Arnold Memorial

Prize presented to Ashley Valerio, and the Susan Everitt Hudgins Prize presented to Makenzie Kistler.

The Alumnae Association also announced the 2019 Faculty Award Winner, Dr. Carol Pulham '76, Chair of the Department of History, Literature, and Languages and a professor of English. One nominee wrote, "despite her brilliance, she is humble – she always wants to hear from her students, and gives you the feeling that she is learning every bit as much from you as you are from her." During her acceptance of the award, Pulham spoke about the joy of teaching and learning.

The highlight of Convocation for faculty, staff, and students was the announcement of the 2021 Sophomore Expedition location. This year's incoming class will be traveling to... Costa Rica!



PURSUING ALL PASSIONS: REBECCA DOLAN'S STORY

When Rebecca Dolan '20 first toured Cedar Crest College in 2015 as a high school student, she quickly realized that the campus was home to the best kind of geeks.

Dr. Andre Walther, Associate Professor of Biology, engaged Dolan and her mother in an enthusiastic conversation that left a lasting impression. Everyone on campus seemed to genuinely beam with that same passion.

"Little did I realize," says Dolan, "that this was the norm at Cedar Crest." After a nursing scholarship made her education possible, she committed to Cedar Crest College.

Dolan struggled with the transition

to college life, so she became involved with the Performing Arts department hoping to find her place on campus. During a production of *Alice in Wonderland*, she was asked to step up as the assistant stage manager, a defining moment in Dolan's transformative student experience.

She says, "For a freshman, being able to help call the shots of when pieces of sets, props, or scenery would go on was scary and also a big deal." Since then, Dolan has participated in over a dozen theatre productions both as a stage manager and performer, through which she met some of her closest friends. "It has been the source of many sleepless nights, most of which were the good kind of sleepless

nights, either in rehearsal or writing out rehearsal reports, and I still think of it as being one of the highlights of my time at Cedar Crest."

This was not the only pivotal firstyear moment for Dolan. During the course, "Not All Heroes Are Men or Courage Across Four Continents," Dolan connected with Dr. James Ward, Professor of History.

"One day, I was talking to him about important revolutions in history and I brought up the Hungarian Revolution of 1956," she says, "and he seemed taken aback by the fact that I had even heard of this event." When he asked Dolan if she studied that period of history, she said she had not.



Dr. Ward asked her, "Well, why don't you? What is stopping you?" He suggested she study abroad, and with the help of faculty, Dolan was able to create a study abroad plan that would not interfere with the rigors of her nursing classes.

Shortly after, Dolan traveled alone for the first time in her life to Budapest, Hungary for a month of classes at the University of Pecs. Despite some challenges, like a language barrier with roommates from Romania and Japan, Dolan says, "I wouldn't trade this experience for anything in the world. I did not want to leave Hungary. I still keep in contact with both of my roommates and some of the other friends I made while I was

there. It also helped me further realize my passion for history."

For some, this may have been a once-in-a-lifetime experience, but that was not the case for Dolan. She also traveled to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, during the Sophomore Expedition, which added a cross-cultural dimension to her nursing studies. "We had the chance to go inside the Oswaldo Cruz Foundation where we toured a newly constructed facility that made vaccines, and we also went to one of their hospitals that

specialized in epidemiology," she said.

Now, Dolan geeks out about her own passions—nursing, theater, and history—to prospective students in her role as an admissions ambassador. Upon graduation, she is considering becoming a physician's assistant or obtaining her master's in history.

The people and experiences of Cedar Crest ignited Dolan's dynamic passions. No matter where her future takes her, there is one thing of which she is certain: "I am so fortunate to have come to Cedar Crest for my undergraduate education."

IT'S NOT A STRAIGHT LINE: AN INTERVIEW WITH KIM RACON '03

Kim Racon is a 2003 graduate of Cedar Crest College and currently is the Senior Marketing Associate in the Academic Marketing department at HarperCollins Publishers in New York City. At Cedar Crest, Kim kept busy, majoring in English and gender studies, while also earning minors in history and philosophy. She honed her leadership skills as the President of her class for four years (and counting, as alumnae class president) and a member of the Cedar Crest tennis team. After graduating from the Crest, Racon went on to pursue doctoral studies at Lehigh University where she also served as a senior teaching fellow and adjunct lecturer. She was also an adjunct instructor in Cedar Crest's English department.

Originally from Clark, New Jersey, Kim now lives in New York City with Jenn and their cat, Emmie Otter. We asked Kim a few questions about her life at the Crest, after graduation, and in her career. This is what she had to say:



AT THE CREST

Q How did you become interested in studying English?

A When I was three, I sat next to my Dad on our loveseat and read aloud to him *Green Eggs and Ham*, and I guess that's when I fell in love with reading and stories and really it just went from there.

Q How did your time at Cedar Crest shape your future?

A Cedar Crest allowed me the space to grow into myself as a person in the world, as a critical thinker and questioner and participant in society and within the communities in which I lived. I credit everyone from our amazing faculty, to then President Blaney, to Nan and Jan who cleaned Butz Hall my sophomore through senior years, to the Allen House staff, to Larry Jasper in security who once, in the security buggy, rode up next to me and asked, "What's the speed limit for walking?" and just drove away. Cedar Crest was an active participatory community of care and genuine interest by everyone connected to the College.

Q Tell us about the most rewarding part of your Cedar Crest experience.

A The most rewarding part was being selected by the college community on my graduation day for the Butz Prize, which was given to the student who had demonstrated the most influence on her college life and association. Firstly, it was a complete surprise because I wasn't expecting it (how could you?!) and they only announced it at graduation. Secondly, it was an award

selected by the entire college: students, staff, and faculty wrote in nominations and a bit about why the person should be nominated, and then I guess the mostnominated person won? I've no idea. But Dean Joan Laffey basically read my college career back to me, and I was just dumbfounded, really. A few weeks after, I saw Dr. Micah Sadigh and he said, "You looked so stunned, like you had no idea how much you did and meant!" I was very stunned, as I didn't know or realize my impact, and it means a lot to know.

Q What was your most valuable student experience at Cedar Crest?

A Specifically, I'd say Dr. Pulham's Chaucer class, which she suggested I take my second semester. I fell in love with Chaucer and Middle English literature through that class, which shaped my academic career in graduate school. Generally, I'd say any class in the English department, as those classes shaped how I learned to be a teacher.

Q What advice would you give to a current Cedar Crest student or someone thinking about studying English?

A There's so much you can do with a degree in English—to most people, it looks like you're reading a lot of books (and you are), but you're also exploring ideas, cultures, points of view that may not be yours. And you're being taught to think critically about the place of ideas in the world and how to articulate cogent, meaningful arguments in a world tilting towards sound bites. Those critical thinking skills are your

superpowers: they are your responsibility to teach to others and to use the ones you have to build a more informed, critically aware and engaged society. Go on, do it. I challenge you.

Q Is there anything you didn't do at Cedar Crest that you wish you had?

A I probably should've caved to peer pressure and played softball.

Q Why do you continue to give back to your alma mater?

A I think it's important to give back to the place that's given me so much and means so much to me. Giving back in terms of dollars is always great, but so, too, is time and getting to know current students, particularly those in the English department. And it's nice to still keep Dr. Fletcher and Dr. Pulham on their toes.

ON HER CAREER

Q What is it like to work at HarperCollins?

A It's great: I work in our Academic Marketing department, so I get to read and think about books and come up with projects and materials that market our books to college and university faculty. I'm lucky to have been given charge of lists that are similar to my academic background, and also do things I've just wanted to do, like start a podcast series.

Q What was the best interview you ever did with an author?

A Oh, that's tough. I loved talking with Ruth Hogan because her novel, *The Keeper of Lost Things*, was a bit of a sleeper hit in our market. Talking with Sarah Perry twice was wonderful, for *The Essex Serpent* and *Melmoth*, because she is so brilliant. I'm very fortunate through my podcast interviews, I've connected with our authors as people and not just as part of a business package.

Q What do you wish you'd known when first starting out in your career?

A That if it's not a straight line to what you thought you were going to do, it doesn't mean you've failed. Still working on that.

GETTING PERSONAL

Q What are some current projects, activities, or accomplishments that you would like to showcase and why are they significant in your life?

A I'll actually make my directorial debut in a microfilm festival in September, which is wild because I absolutely never thought or imagined I'd ever use the word "filmmaker" to describe myself. You really do never stop learning.

Q What does the future look like for you?

A ...do you have a crystal ball I don't know about?

Q How do you spend your time when you are not at work?

A I kayak in the Hudson River with the Turtles of Inwood Canoe Club.

Q How important has your family been throughout your journey from College to career?

A We publish a wonderful book called *Getting From College to Career* by Lindsey Pollack, out from Harper Business! My parents are wacky and wonderful, and I simply wouldn't be who I am without them. Tina Fey once thanked her parents by saying, "I want to thank my parents for raising me to have confidence that is somehow disproportionate with my looks and abilities," and I think that applies here, too.

Q What is your favorite book? Who is your favorite author?

A Oh boy! I'll say the Scottish writer Ali Smith. And if you need to start somewhere, start with *Artful*. Equally though: Kate Atkinson and her novel *Life After Life*.

Q Coffee or tea?

A Coffee in the morning; tea during the day or at night.

Q Favorite New York City street food?

A In summer? Ice cream trucks. I've a sixth sense for ice cream trucks in summer. Otherwise: Hot dogs. There's a whole ranking and points system.





THE CEDAR CREST COLLEGE SCHOOL OF NURSING **ACROSS THE GLOBE**

In January 2019, 12 students, alumni, faculty and staff traveled to Tanzania as a part of a nursing study tour. The group, made up of pre-nursing students, current students and nurses, provided care in three remote villages including members of the Masai Tribe. The School of Nursing set a local record for delivering care to the highest number of community residents during their visits. They also delivered over 600 pounds of donated supplies to the people of Tanzania. The group concluded their trip with a visit to Serengeti National Park where they observed elephants, lions, giraffes and zebras, just to name a few. In September, a new group will begin preparing for a nursing study tour to Panama. This group will study in the fall semester and travel in early January 2020.

NURSING NEWS



The master's degree program in nursing and Doctor of Nursing Practice program at Cedar Crest College School of Nursing have received initial accreditation by the

Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education. A team of expert peer reviewers conducted an on-site visit in September and spoke to students, faculty and community constituents. After the on-site visit, the program was reviewed by the Accreditation Review Committee and officially approved by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) Board of Commissioners in May 2019.
